



### PLANNING A GIFT TO HOSPICE

"If I could take my fur off, I'd do it like a shot  
When - in the height of summer - it gets so jolly hot! ..."  
Those are the opening lines of a piece of cat poetry, written by feline-loving Karen Stanley.

Karen, who has a degree in English, has written about a hundred poems about cats and even won an American Cat Writers' Award for her published book of poems, called *Purrceptions*.

The delightful poem continues ...

"I'd fold it all up neatly and place it on a chair -  
Then, in the nude completely, I'd frolic in fresh air.  
But what if I purrspired and lost weight in the heat ...  
So, when I was refurbished, it fell down round my feet?  
I would not have my raincoat, my skin would get all wet ...  
I'd likely catch a dose of flu and have to see my vet!  
O what a pesky pickle, O what a fearful fix ...  
I'd better reconsider, and stick to cooling licks!"

Recently Karen's poetry writing was interrupted by a week-long stay in the inpatient unit at Arohanui Hospice. Her stay followed the diagnosis of a cancerous tumour in her urinary tract, a hole in the posterior wall of her bowel, and a hernia. Karen had been unwell for some months and benefited from the care and compassion provided by the inter-disciplinary clinical team.

"As soon as I walked into the room at Arohanui and saw the lavender quilt, I knew I was in the right place," says a grateful Karen.

She instantly liked the bright quilted bedcover and the view of the vibrant orange canna lilies in the well-kept garden outside her window. And she speaks highly of the Hospice staff.

"The doctors and nurses in the inpatient unit were wonderful. They're compassionate and supportive, and really took time to show me they care."

As well as receiving vital care from the doctors and nurses, Karen also received lots of information about the benefits of a "low residue diet". It is a diet similar to a low fibre diet, restricting foods that increase bowel activity. Karen needs to avoid fruits with skins or seeds, raw vegetables, nuts and pulpy juices.

Giving patients dietary information is just one part of a complete "plan of care". This plan of care is created in partnership with the patient and the patient's family, with input from nurses and medical officers, social workers, pastoral and day-stay co-ordinators.

The priority for clinical staff is to manage each patient's symptoms, so that where possible patients can return to their preferred environment, usually their own home.

After her stay at Arohanui Hospice, Karen returned home to her two 5-year old Tonkinese cats, Cosmos and Cacao, her poetry and her work as a proof-reader/copy editor. She has since started attending the

day-stay programme at Arohanui Hospice each Tuesday to maintain contact with staff and volunteers.

"I get inspiration from others at day-stay, who are in a similar situation to me. And I'm enjoying the arts and crafts. I didn't know I had any 'craftiness' in me, but I've made a card for a friend, and done some collage."

Karen is fitting in her Hospice visits around her work, which she is determined to continue for as long as she is able. For 10 years she has been proof-reading the theses and papers of masters and PhD students.

When she is not working or writing poetry Karen enjoys reading and singing. She says she has been a member of the local choral society "forever".

With only her two cats for company Karen says she misses her husband greatly.

"Tom was a real character and had a great sense of humour. He had to have, to marry me!"

Karen and Tom were married for 36 years. Unfortunately Tom passed away in 2008, without the opportunity to benefit from hospice care.

To help ensure that hospice care is available free for future patients and their families, Karen has decided to leave a gift to Arohanui Hospice in her Will.

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## Chief Executive Message

I hope all our hospice supporters have had a good summer break and I wish you all a successful 2010. 2009 was a busy year with many challenges and successes. Highlights in 2009 include the achievement of an 'Outstanding Achievement Award' linked to the Quality Health New Zealand accreditation process. We were pleased to receive additional funding from the government that was pledged in the election. However, even with this we still need \$3,300 a day from the community to support the quality care we give to over 550 patients and their families each year.

In October 2009 our Education and Research Unit won the 'Excellence in Training and Education Award' sponsored by MidCentral DHB. Congratulations to the team and all our clinical people for their support.

This year we have had to increase our medical and community nursing staff numbers to enable us to continue to provide quality service to people in our region who need it.

A big thank you to Derek Tuck, Neil Finch and Ron Eaton who achieved a record level of financial support for our 'Farming for Hospice' scheme last year. These gentlemen have made a terrific contribution to Arohanui Hospice for the past 16 years.

Another major contributor to our community fundraising efforts has been our hospice shop. Many thanks to Pam and the volunteers who worked hard to ensure the successful move of the shop from Ngata Street to Rangitikei Street in December. I also acknowledge the excellent support of Vicki Nell who, as a volunteer, worked closely with us all to oversee the lead up planning of the move. Many organisations contributed to the move and I thank them also.

Looking ahead we are delighted that Robyn Higgins and her family have agreed to name our annual fundraising golf tournament the 'Arohanui Hospice Michael Higgins Memorial Golf Tournament'. This is fitting as Michael

gave personal support to the hospice over many years and supported Robyn when she led the 'Hearts and Homes' fundraising event for us.

We are also opening a shop in Levin in March and I thank all the people of Horowhenua who have enthusiastically offered to support this new fundraising initiative.

Arohanui Hospice is blessed with a committed Board of Trustees lead by Roger Clausen, a Senior Leadership and Management team comprising of Dr Simon Allan, Clare Randall, Bridget Marshall and myself, a hard working clinical team supported by fundraising, an administration team and over 320 loyal volunteers.

All these people are at the heart of what makes Arohanui Hospice a very special place.

## Blankets to brighten day-stay

Children at St Anthony's School in Pahiatua have put their newly acquired knitting skills to use creating colourful "peggy squares". The squares were later sewn together to make blankets and have been donated to Arohanui Hospice. The blankets will be used by day-stay patients.

The children were taught to knit by Mary Lucas, their teacher aide.

"The kids didn't know anything about knitting at all before they started, so we had lots of dropped stitches and muddles. But Mary was very patient in teaching them and helping unpick things when needed," explains Rae Powell, the Class 4 teacher.

The children spent their lunch hours knitting and often took their project home, which meant the parents got involved too. The knitting needles and wool were all donated by parents.

Ms Powell says they chose the Hospice as the recipient for the blankets because they wanted to make life brighter for someone who may be having a hard time.

"Mary and I have known people in our community that have used the hospice's services. We've heard wonderful things about the work you do."

Arohanui Hospice palliative care co-ordinators regularly visit patients throughout the Tararua area, occasionally stretching as far as Herbertville and Akitio.

## Roger Clausen accepts award on behalf of volunteers

Roger Clausen has been described in the media as a man of adventure and charisma. He's a Harley Davidson rider who received the Queen's Service Medal (QSM) for his community work in 2004 and was the Manawatu Standard's 2008 Person of the Year. Last year he was recognised with a Palmerston North City Council Civic Award for the work he has done for the people of Palmerston North.

We acknowledge Roger's outstanding work as chairman of our Board of Trustees. He has volunteered as a board member for 16 years and been its chair since 2003. Roger has raised over \$100,000 clocking up tens of thousands of kilometres riding his motorbike all over the world with Gareth and Jo Morgan, and shared his stories with hundreds of community groups.

Receiving the Civic Award also recognises Roger's services to Rotary, the Lutheran Homes Trust Board and the New Zealand Rugby Museum.

Possibly less well known is his work for the Lutheran Homes Trust Board. He has been a Trustee for 30 years and was a member of the original committee of St Luke's Church that looked at options for a civic project. This materialised as a village of 33 rental units in Matipo Street and Tremaine Avenue. It provides low cost housing for 35 older people.

Roger is an active Lutheran Church leader – a member of their Pastoral Leadership Team and a lay preacher.

He has been a Rotarian for 20 years and has been a local Past President and a District Governor's area representative. He was awarded Rotary International's highest award for outstanding service to Rotary and the community – a Paul Harris Fellow – in 1999. Not only has Roger made a big contribution to Palmerston North Rotary, he has been recognised for his international humanitarian efforts.

Roger played representative rugby for Manawatu and is a valued member of the Management Committee of the NZ Rugby Museum. He has served on the committee since 1993 and his governance experience and wise counsel is greatly valued.

Alongside his charitable work Roger maintains a significant farming partnership with his brother in Manawatu and is a successful beef, cropping and dairy farmer.

## Arohanui training tops

In October last year the Arohanui Hospice Education and Research Unit (ERU) were thrilled to win the Excellence in Training and Education Award at the MidCentral DHB Health Awards.

The ERU recognises that education and research together form the basis of all evidence-based quality health provision. Their vision is to provide co-ordinated quality education and research to support those delivering palliative care in the Manawatu, Rangitikei, Taranui, and Horowhenua region.

Identifying a need for development in education and training initiatives, Arohanui Hospice appointed nurse educator Bridget Marshall to develop, co-ordinate and facilitate an education programme, supporting community partners in delivering palliative care.

In 2008 over 1,000 people made use of training opportunities provided by the ERU.

Since 2005 MidCentral DHB has hosted an awards programme as a way of acknowledging the excellent work that primary and secondary health providers do to improve health outcomes for those living within the region.

The Health Awards are open to any individual, team or organisation working to benefit the health and wellbeing of the people within MidCentral District. The theme for the 2009 Health Awards was Innovation and over 520 people attended the dinner and ceremony. Arohanui Hospice was also very pleased to be nominated for three other awards:

**Supreme Award - Innovation of the Year**, Liverpool Care Pathway Project; **Kotahitanga Award - Operational Quality Controls**, Arohanui Hospice Quality Team; **Excellence in Collaboration and Integration Award**, Liverpool Care Pathway Project.
